Dear Sir/Madam,

I note the recent decision not to proceed with the GST for the time being.

In this regard, this has to be looked at in light of the background. The $\mu \kappa$

government is presently sitting on a massive sum of money obtained from ${\tt HK}$ taxpayers over the years. Tax money obtained since the British took over the

colony in the 19th Century. Thus, people disagree that the Government should be looking to squeeze even more money from taxpayers without dealing with this 'mountain' of money.

I would suggest that the Government consider 'spending' the mountain first, by making proposals such as payment of a pension to all HK people over the age of 60.
